OPC Ecumenicity

In the New Testament the teaching of the unity of God's people is sustained (see Eph. 2:11-22 and 4:1-16). Yet the situation is different. The people of God are no longer circumscribed by ethnic, political, or geographical boundaries. All nations are to be discipled. This unity includes the people of God in past ages and also looks to the future and includes all people who have yet believe on his name (John 17:20-21).

The gospel proclaimed by the apostles as the foundation of the church resulted in establishing churches as covenant communities in various locations, churches which were ruled by elders.

These churches and their elders were not independent, but were one body united by Christ their head, by the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit, and by the covenant promise of God. The elders at Antioch and Jerusalem resolve a problem, under God, and their decision is binding on the churches (see Acts 15, 16:4).

The Christian Reformed Churches of the Netherlands (CGKN)

The Christian Reformed Churches (Christelijk Gereformeerde Kerken in Nederland - CGK) of the Netherlands are the continuing work of the Protestant Reformation from the 1550s and onward. The GKN is a federation of churches of the low-lying lands (the netherlands). The key confessional documents of the Reformed Churches were the Belgic Confession, first published in 1561, and the Heidelberg Catechism, first published in 1563, and of the Canons of Dort (1618). These became known as the Three Forms of Unity in that these documents in that they expressed the common faith of the Reformed believers in the Netherlands and around the globe.

In the 17th and 18th century a reforming emphasis was placed on the personal experience of faith and led to further Reformation. The GKN came into being in 1892 and today has approximately 75,000 members, from 180 local churches within her federation. The GKN's ministry is principally directed towards the local community church.

The heartbeat of the GKN is the centrality of teaching (catechizing) lead by the local session that culminates in the weekly preaching of the Word. Pray that the fruits of her work can be seen in the daily confession and walk of the local church and her people.

OPC Congregation of the Week

Pilgrim Church (OPC), Maine, was formed in 1952 by Christians who desired a church reformed in doctrine and worship in Bangor, Maine – a stronghold of liberal congregationalism. Reformed in doctrine means that we look to the great affirmations of the Protestant Reformation: Scripture alone, grace alone, faith alone, and in Christ alone.

These great statements declare: how we know God, how God befriends us, how we can please God, and how He saves us from sin and its eternal consequences. Reformed in worship means that our worship is according to the principles of Scripture.

Pilgrim Church has 147 communicant members and is governed by the session, which is made up of the Pastor and six elders. Pilgrim OPC have four deacons, who lead the congregation in ministries of mercy. As a particular congregation of the Orthodox Presbyterian Church, all of their officers believe the Bible to be the Word of God, the only infallible rule of faith and practice. Additionally, the officers subscribe to the American Presbyterian Church 1789 version of the Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechisms,

acknowledging that these subordinate standards accurately summarize what the Bible teaches.

Pilgrim Church is a praying church with a mid-week prayer and study meeting, a long-established small group ministry involving the majority of our congregation and a prayer group that meets monthly to pray for the persecuted church world-wide.

Pilgrim have articulated their mission to equip the saints to build "Deeper Roots, Wider Branches and Abiding Roots." The commitment to this vision has been actualized over the years by the active engagement of our members in the community.

In 1980 members of Pilgrim Church founded parent-sponsored Penobscot Christian School and a few years later First Step Pregnancy Resource Center both of which have grown over the years into major community ministries involving brothers and sisters from nearly 30 area churches. Pilgrim also have an active nursing home ministry. This fall marks the opening of the newest Pilgrim ministry: The Tan House for Men provides a residential house where young men coming to the Bangor area to further their education or start careers can live in a stable, affordable environment structured to provide Christian discipleship and encourage regular interaction with older male mentors.

Mr. Russell J. Hamilton was called to be the pastor of Pilgrim OPC in December 2007. Prior to coming to Bangor, he served as a church planter, for 3 years in Bucksport, Maine, and for 6 years in New Orleans, Louisiana. His pastoral education is from Knox Theological Seminary in Fort Lauderdale, Florida (M.Div.). He was born in Edinburgh, Scotland. He is married and has 4 children.

A few details are worth noting about his time of service on the Committee: John was first elected to the Committee on Home Missions and Church Extension (CHMCE) at the 52nd GA in 1985 and has served without interruption since. The Committee so appreciated his service that he was elected VP in 1986, and served in that capacity until 1991. At that point, he was elected President of the Committee in 1991, and has served in that capacity until the present day. During that time, he
